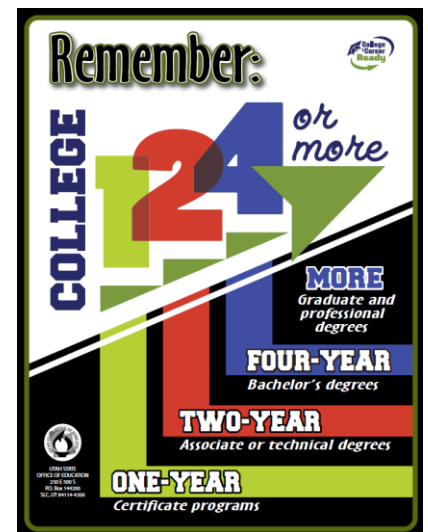


<p align="center"><u>INTERNSHIPS</u></p> <p>Internships are individually tailored to bring motivated students together with community professionals to explore career possibilities and gain on-the-job experience. Apply with the Internship Learning Coordinator in the Salem Hills High School Counseling Office. Take a related CTE course to be eligible. (Grades 11 & 12)</p>	<p align="center"><u>MOUNTAINLAND TECHNOLOGY COLLEGE (MTECH)</u></p> <p>You can take classes that are specific to a career and save on tuition as a High School student. Course booklets are available in the Salem Hills High School Counseling Office. Most courses require that you have all credits in line to graduate from high school before enrolling. www.mtec.edu</p>	<p align="center"><u>ADVANCED LEARNING CENTER (ALC)</u></p> <p>Program that allows students to take advanced classes while staying enrolled in their resident school during grades 10 - 12. <p align="center"><u>UVU LIVE INTERACTIVE CLASSES (DISTANCE LEARNING)</u></p> <p>Earn college credit by taking classes at the ALC from UVU teachers by interactive TV. Cost is \$5 per Credit. Follow UVU's schedule. Students receive regular high school credit for taking the class and can opt to pay a fee to take a test in the spring. If passed, the student receives college semester credits. www.collegeboard.com/student</p>	<p align="center"><u>UVU CONCURRENT ENROLLMENT</u></p> <p>Earn college credit by taking classes at SHHS from SHHS teachers. Students in grades 9 – 12 now have the option to take selected courses online through Utah Students Connect.</p> <p>Check with your Jr. High or High School Counselor to sign up for Utah Students Connect online classes.</p>	<p>SCHOLARSHIPS</p> <p>Begin by keeping a written resume of awards, leadership positions, extracurricular activities, service, clubs, CTE Pathways completion, Skills USA Competitions, employment, etc. Maintain high GPA, take college prep course of study, prepare for and take the ACT.</p> 
<p>REGENTS' SCHOLARSHIP</p> <p>The Regents' Scholarship encourages Utah high school students to prepare for college academically and financially by taking a core course of study and saving for college. The scholarship may be used at any public college or university in the Utah System of Higher Education. (No longer available at private universities in Utah.)</p> <p>Utahfutures.org/regents-scholarship</p>	<p>CENTENNIAL SCHOLARSHIP</p> <p>This scholarship is earned by graduating from high school early. It must be used at a Utah college within one year of graduating. Amounts may vary depending upon graduation date. May use at public and private universities and colleges in Utah.</p> <p>https://www.schools.utah.gov/curr/earlycollege</p>	<p>NEW CENTURY SCHOLARSHIP</p> <p>Receive a scholarship for graduating with your Associates degree at the same time you graduate from high school. Only useable at six major state universities. <p>FREE APPLICATION FOR FEDERAL STUDENT FINANCIAL AID (FAFSA)</p> <p>You can take the FAFSA4Caster to help determine what kind of assistance you could receive. You will need to fill out a FAFSA to receive student loans and/or financial aid.</p> <p>https://fafsa.ed.gov/</p>	<p>ACT</p> <p>Register for the ACT your junior year. You should be academically ready to take it by spring. If not, take it early in your senior year. Seniors are strongly encouraged to take the ACT sometime in September, October, or December of their senior year so they can receive results in time for college admissions and various academic scholarships. Students should register online.</p> <p>www.actstudent.org</p> <p>FREE Study for ACT: SCHMOOP is now on your Canvas Account!</p>	<p>ARE FOUR YEARS OF COLLEGE RIGHT FOR YOU?</p> <p>Take an interest inventory on UtahFutures, do an internship in high school, take lots of different classes, get a job as a teen and learn how to work. Learn about what you like to do and are good at, or not. Base your future career on what you learn about yourself and then choose the right education to help you reach your goal. Technical skills are in high demand. There are many high-paying jobs that require only a one-year certificate or two-year degree, which costs less than four years of college.</p>
